

The Young James Clerk Maxwell: Scotland 1831-1850

Born at 14 India Street, Edinburgh, now the home of the James Clerk Maxwell Foundation
Only child
Father a lawyer of independent spirit and means, with an interest in the latest science of the day











- Maxwell spent much of his early years on the family estate of Glenlair in Kirkcudbrightshire
- He enjoyed messing around in the countryside and making youthful 'experiments'
- He was always asking questions like "What's the go o' that?"
- The family house burnt down in 1929 but a restoration programme is being organised by The Maxwell at Glenlair Trust






Glenlair house at the 175th anniversary of Maxwell's birth. Some restoration has since been carried out.

Edinburgh Academy, Maxwell's school



THE NEW EDINBURGE ACADEMY.



At the age of 8 Maxwell was sent to the then new school of Edinburgh Academy where he met other gifted children

- Over the years he rose to equal or exceed them
- He was good at the classics and English literature as well as maths and science
- Had his first 'scientific' (mathematical) paper accepted by the Royal Society of Edinburgh when aged 14

- 1847-1850 Maxwell attended Edinburgh University where he studied Philosophy, Maths, Physics, Logic and Metaphysics for 3 years as a private student
- Read works in Greek, Latin and French for fun
 He made many home experiments
